



Honors Courses 2017-2018

Anthropology 2201H:

Introduction to Archaeology (3 credits) Dr. Robert Cook. Tues and Thurs 11:10 am-12:30 pm. World prehistory from origin of human culture through development of civilization illustrated by examples; archaeological field method; concepts of analysis and interpretation. Prereq: Not open to students with credit for 2201H (201H) or 201. **GE social science individuals and groups and diversity global studies course.**

English 1110.02H: *Honors First-Year English Composition (3 credits) Dr. Robert Hughes. Tues and Thurs 9:35am-10:55 am.* Literature focus (Homer, Shakespeare, Racine, Marlowe). The course will advance your university-level reading and writing skills as well as your critical thinking and analytical skills. The readings include foundational texts of Western culture on the theme of love. Prereq: Honors standing, and 28 or above on the English section of the ACT or 660 on the verbal section of the SAT; or permission of instructor. Not open to students with credit for 1110.01 **GE writing and communication course: level 1.**

Geography 2750H: *World Regional Geography (4 credits) Dr. Kenneth Madsen. Tues and Thurs 12:45pm-2:05pm.* An examination of the human and physical geographic structure of all world regions, defined primarily at the continental scale. Examines regions in global context. Prereq: Honors standing, or permission of instructor. Not open to students with credit for 2750 (200) or 200H. **GE social science human, natural, and economic resources and diversity global studies course.**

History 2750E: *Natives and Newcomers: Immigration and Migration in U.S. History. (3 credits) Dr. Lucy Murphy. Tues and Thurs 9:35 am-10:55 am.* General survey of immigration history in the U.S. from precolonial times to the present. Topics include cultural contact, economic relations, citizenship, politics, family and sexuality. Prereq: Honors standing, or permission of instructor. Prereq or concur: English 1110.xx. Not open to students with credit for 322, 322H, or WGSSSt 2750H (332H). **GE historical study and diversity, social diversity in the US course.**

History 2800E: *Introduction to the Discipline of History. (3 credits) Dr. Michel Mangus. Mon and Weds 12:45pm-2:05pm.* Investigation of the methods and analytical approaches historians use to understand the past. Prereq or concur: English 1110.xx. Not open to students with credit for 2800 (398) or 2800H (398H). **GE historical studies and social diversity course.**

Psychology

1100H: *Introduction to Psychology (3 credits) Dr. Julie Hupp. Tues and Thurs 11:10am-12:30pm.* A prerequisite to advanced courses; a broad survey of psychological science. Students will further develop critical thinking skills by writing papers and participating in activities. Prereq: Honors standing, or permission of instructor. Not open to students with credit for 1100 (100), 1100E (100E), or 100H. **GE social science individuals and groups and diversity, social diversity in the US course.**

Psychology

3331E: *Abnormal*

Psychology (3 credits) Dr. Janice McLean. Tues and Thurs 2:20pm-3:40pm.

Examination of current theories and empirical findings regarding the major forms of psychopathology.

Prereq: Honors standing, and 1100 (100) or 1100H (100H); or permission of instructor.

Not open to students with credit for 2367.02, 3331 (331), 3331H (331H), or 331E. **Psychology major course.**

Psychology

4543E: *Psychology of Gender (3 credits) Dr. Elizabeth Weiss. Mon and Weds 11:10am- 12:30pm.*

An examination of the origins and implications of gender differences and similarities and the role that gender plays in the interpretation of behavior. Prereq: Honors standing, and 2220 and 2300. Not open to students with credit for 4543 (543) or 543E. **Psychology major class.**

SPRING 2018

Classics 2220H: *Classical Mythology (3 credits) Dr. Dana Munteanu. Mon and Weds 12:45 pm-2:05pm.*

This course is designed to familiarize you with classical myth while deepen critical thinking skills by: exploring how we have constantly reinterpreted the ancient stories in literature, visual

arts, and music, (2) learning variety of theoretical approaches to understanding myth, and (3) developing your own project inspired by Greek and Roman mythology. **GE literature; global studies**

Music 2251E: *The World of Classical Music (3 credits).*

Dr. Paul Sanders. Mon and Weds 9:35am-10:55am. In this introduction to classical music, we explore not only the traditional topics—genres, composers, styles, and historical periods—but ways that classical music is used in film. No music background is required. **GE visual and performing arts and diversity/global studies course.**

Psychology 2220E: *Data Analysis in Psychology (3 credits).*

Dr. Elizabeth Weiss. Tues and Thurs 9:35am-10:55am. Discussion of statistical analysis of psychological data - random samples, graphical and numerical techniques of descriptive statistics, correlation, regression, probability, sampling distribution, and hypothesis testing. Prereq: Honors standing, and 1100 (100) or 1100H (100H), and Stat 1450 (145), Math 1148 (148), 1149, 1150 (150), 1251.xx (151), 152, or Math Placement Level M or above; or permission of instructor. Not open to students with credit for 2220 (220), 2220H

(220H), 320, or 320H.

Psychology major class.

Women's Gender & Sexuality Studies 1110H:

Gender Sex & Power (3 credits). Dr. Tiyi Morris.

Tues and Thurs 9:35am-10:55am.

This course introduces students from diverse backgrounds and disciplines to the interdisciplinary field of Women's, Gender and Sexuality Studies. This course draws on a variety of literatures to analyze gender, race, sexuality, and other dimensions of identity; explores critical issues of gender, sex and power; and places the study of U.S. women and gender roles in broader transnational context. Required course for the WGSS major and minor. Prereq: Honors stand; not open to students with credit for 110, 110H, 101, 101H. **GE cultures and ideas; social diversity in the U.S.; social science: individuals and groups**

**** H=Honors (a separate honors class)**

E=Embedded (students are in the standard class with different expectations)

NOTE: Some colleges count 3000-level or 4000-level courses taken in freshman and sophomore year as Honors courses. Example: A&S accepts History 3000+ as Honors.
